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Guide to the F-1/J-1 Visa Process

Students may apply for an F or J visa up to 12 months before the start date listed on their Form I-20 or DS-2019. Do not delay—pay the [I-901 SEVIS fee](#) and apply for the visa as early as possible.

Students who receive a Form I-20 apply for an F-1 visa, while those who receive a Form DS-2019 apply for a J-1 visa.

Step 1: Review your Form I-20 or DS-2019

Check that all of your biographical information (name, date of birth, etc.) is accurate. If any corrections are needed, email oisnewstudent@fordham.edu.

Note About Majors on the I-20: Some students notice that the “Major” on page 1 of the I-20 doesn’t exactly match the program listed in their Admission Letter. This is normal and not a cause for concern. The I-20 major is tied to a CIP Code assigned by your academic department and may differ slightly due to U.S. government terminology. When completing the DS-160, use the major from your Admission Letter.

Step 2: Print and sign your I-20 or DS-2019

Print the document and staple all pages together. A printed copy of your I-20 or DS-2019 is required for both your visa interview and travel.

Sign on the signature line at the bottom of the first page, at the “X” above your typed name. Digital signatures are not accepted—you must sign and date the form in ink.

Step 3: Apply for an F-1 or J-1 visa with the U.S. Embassy in your country

A visa allows you to travel to a U.S. port of entry and request admission. To enter the U.S., you must carry a printed and signed I-20 or DS-2019 along with your F-1 or J-1 visa. Apply for your visa as soon as possible. Review the current wait time for an interview using the [Global Visa Wait Times table](#)

Note: Citizens of Canada and Bermuda are visa-exempt, but they must still:

- Obtain an I-20 or DS-2019
- Pay the SEVIS fee
- Present the payment receipt at the port of entry

Visa application steps:

1. Apply at a [U.S. Embassy or Consulate](#) in your home country.
2. Complete the DS-160 visa application and print the DS-160 confirmation page with the application ID number after submitting it online.
 - a. If you don't have a U.S. contact or a local address for your DS-160, you may list Ana Belzunce as your contact person and use your campus OIS office address (Rose Hill or Lincoln Center, found on page 2) as your intended address in the U.S.
3. Pay the Visa Application Fee (MRV fee). Payment procedures vary by consulate.
4. Schedule your biometrics appointment and visa interview following the instructions from the U.S. consulate. To make the appointment, you will need:
 - a. DS-160 application ID number
 - b. MRV receipt
 - c. Passport number
 - d. SEVIS ID number
5. Review important visa interview guidance on the [NAFSA website](#).

Follow the instructions provided by your U.S. consulate for attending your visa appointment. You will need to bring the following documents:

- DS-160 confirmation page with the application ID number
- MRV (visa application) fee receipt
- Printed I-20 or DS-2019
- I-901 SEVIS fee payment receipt (see Step 5)
- Photo
- Valid passport
- Additional documents may be required, such as:
 - Transcripts, diplomas, degrees, and standardized test scores
 - Financial guarantee documents

Step 4: Pay the I-901 SEVIS fee

The I-901 SEVIS fee must be paid at least 3 days before your visa interview.

You must pay this fee for each new Initial I-20 or DS-2019 SEVIS ID. However, students who receive a “transfer pending” I-20 or DS-2019 from Fordham do not need to pay the fee again if they begin classes within 5 months of their last enrollment.

First, watch the [Student and Exchange Visitor Program \(SEVP\) I-901 SEVIS Fee tutorial](#), then pay the fee online. It is recommended that you save a copy of your payment receipt.

Avoid scams: [FMJFee.com](#) is the only official website authorized to collect I-901 SEVIS fee payments.

You must pay the SEVIS I-901 fee if:

- You are applying for an initial F-1 or J-1 visa at a U.S. consulate.
- You are a Canadian citizen seeking admission at a port of entry for the first time (even though Canadians are visa-exempt).

Step 5: Plan for departure

F-1/J-1 visa regulations allow you to enter the U.S. up to 30 days before the start date on your I-20/DS-2019. Do not arrive earlier than this. Check the “EARLIEST ADMISSION DATE” on page 1 of your I-20 for the first day you can enter.

Documents to carry when entering the U.S.:

- Keep the following documents in your carry-on bag during travel. Do not place them in checked luggage, as you will need to present them to the immigration officer upon arrival:
 - Passport with F-1 or J-1 visa
 - Your passport must be valid for at least six months beyond your entry date
 - Visa must be valid at the time of arrival (Canadian citizens are visa-exempt)
 - I-20 or DS-2019 issued by Fordham
 - Admission letter (recommended, in case it is requested)
 - Financial documents (recommended, in case proof of funding is requested)
- Once cleared, immigration will return your I-20 or DS-2019 and stamp your passport. Make sure the stamp shows “F-1” or “J-1.”
- If you lose your I-20 or DS-2019: stay calm. Ask the immigration officer for Form I-515, which allows entry as an F-1 for one month. Contact OIS to finalize the form when you check in.

Before traveling to the U.S.:

- Prepare funds to cover initial living expenses, tuition, and housing. Read the banking section below.

- Prepare Your Health and Immunization Records: Bring official immunization records in English (or with a translation) showing vaccines and dates. These are required for submission to Fordham. See the immunization section below for details.
- Complete a physical, vision, and dental exam before departing, as U.S. medical care is expensive and the standard Fordham health insurance excludes dental and vision unless you pay for additional coverage.
- Make housing arrangements. Read the housing section of this guide carefully.
- Plan how you will get to your residence or temporary accommodation upon arrival in New York (e.g., a taxi, public transportation, or a friend's pickup). See our Transportation Options from the Airports section for details.

Step 6: After arriving in the U.S., check in with OIS and attend OIS orientation

Immigration check-in with OIS is required. Failure to complete the check-in process may result in the termination of your legal stay in the United States.

Read the full [OIS Check-In](#) information and complete the check-in form within 10 days of your arrival in the U.S.

OIS holds special mandatory orientations specifically for international students arriving in the Fall and Spring terms. These orientations contain important and useful information for international students, and you must attend them. Information about your OIS orientation can be found on the OIS website, www.fordham.edu/ois, and then by clicking "Programs and Events". Orientation times and locations are confirmed throughout the summer, so if there is no information for your school's orientation, please check back regularly.

Step 7: Maintaining your F-1 or J-1 immigration status

Maintaining an active F-1 or J-1 status is your responsibility. Be sure to review and understand the rules you must follow by reading: [Maintaining lawful F-1 student status](#).

Transportation from the Airport

Proceed to the "Ground Transportation" area. Do not accept offers of transportation from anyone while getting to the ground transportation station. There, the official dispatcher can direct you to legal and safe transportation services if needed.

Transportation Options from NYC-area airports (JFK, EWR, and LGA)

1. **Fordham Ram Van Airport Shuttle Service:** Before all University holidays, including the end of the academic year, the Department of University Transportation provides shuttle service to LaGuardia, JFK, and Newark International airports. Students can learn more about it by visiting the [Ram Van Airport Service](#) webpage.
2. **Car Services:** Reservations for shared-ride van and private car services can be made at the Port Authority Welcome Center located on the Arrivals level of each terminal. If the center is closed, there is a convenient self-service kiosk nearby where you can contact authorized shared-ride or private car services.
3. **Rideshare Apps:** Another option is to utilize car service phone applications such as Uber or Lyft. Be sure to download these on your phone before leaving, and note that you will need working phone service and location abilities in the US to use these apps.
4. **Taxicabs:** The average taxi trip to midtown Manhattan from JFK will cost \$70 (flat fare) plus tolls and about \$50 from LaGuardia. Similar fares will be charged for service to the Bronx. Expect to pay more for a taxi or ride share from Newark, with additional fare charged during peak times. The fare will be shown on a meter inside the taxi and it covers all passengers in the car. The passenger pays all bridge and highway tolls, and a 15-20% tip is customary. To avoid problems, only take yellow cabs at the taxi booth outside the terminal and note the taxi number when you get into the car.
5. **Airtrain and Public Transit Options:** There are many public train and bus options to get from the NYC-area airports to Fordham's campuses or your destination.
 - From JFK, look for the yellow Airtrain icon to connect to Jamaica or Howard beach stations, where further connections to the subway or LIRR are available. You can take LIRR to Grand Central, and then connect to Metro North with service to Fordham station in the Bronx.
 - You can also take the NYC subway and then walk to either campus.
 - From Newark Airport - EWR, you can take the 62 bus to Newark Penn Station, which has PATH train and NJ Transit connections to Manhattan. Alternatively, similar to JFK, you can take the yellow Airtrain to the RailLink station, which also connects to NJ Transit service to New York Penn.
 - Some tickets can be purchased with tap-to-pay or on your phone. Check out transit and navigation apps such as MTA Train Times, NJ Transit, Google

Maps, etc.

- There are additional express bus services to Newark and JFK.

NOTE: NYC subway and buses cost \$3.00 per ride. You may transfer subway trains or from the subway to bus without paying a second fare, but typically need an additional ticket when traveling on commuter rail or outside of NYC

Planning Your Budget & International Transfers of Money

Estimate of Expenses

The cost of living in the New York metropolitan area is high, relative to other areas of the U.S. It is extremely difficult to live in New York City for less than \$2,000 / month. You will need more money if you wish to enjoy social events in New York City, travel to other parts of the U.S., or remain in the U.S. for the summer months. Please note that the cost of tuition and living expenses usually increases each year.

Planning your Budget

If your native language is not English, your department may require you to take an English test upon arrival, regardless of your TOEFL score. Based on the results, you may be required to take classes at Fordham University's Institute of American Language and Culture (IALC). Graduate students may not receive degree credits for these classes. Consequently, the length of time needed to earn your degree, and your costs, may increase.

As an F-1 or J-1 student, you are required to carry a full-time program of study (undergraduate 12 credits; graduate 9 credits; IALC 18 hours/week which is usually 3 courses per week) during the academic year (September to May).

Budgeting & On-Campus Work

You are allowed to get a job on campus. However, please note that if you do not have a Social Security Number already, you may not be able to start working/getting paid until you obtain the SSN, which could take several weeks. Therefore, make sure you have sufficient funds for your first few weeks without payment for your on-campus work.

Initial Expenses

For taxis, meals, telephone calls, etc. you should have about \$200 in small bills and access to \$1,000-\$2,000 through an ATM or debit card. Even in NYC it can be difficult to exchange currency. It is not advisable to carry large amounts of cash.

Social Security Numbers

The student ID number issued by Fordham is NOT a SOCIAL SECURITY NUMBER (SSN) and should not be used in place of SSN (except when first logging into my.fordham.edu). The U.S. government has restrictions on who can apply for a Social Security number, so you may or may not be able to apply for one (it depends on the need). Although not having an SSN may complicate some transactions (i.e. opening a bank account, getting a cell phone), it is possible to accomplish these things without a SSN. The OIS can advise you on how to successfully accomplish these goals.

Banking

You don't need a social security number to open a bank account. However, some banks may request a letter issued by our office to prove that you are an international student. If you need a bank letter, please email ois@fordham.edu for assistance.

Transfer of Funds

If your country allows foreign exchange transfers, you should find a bank in your home country that can transfer funds to a corresponding bank in New York. The OIS can provide any official letters needed to obtain permission to exchange currency. The major banks have branches in New York City. Delays in bank transfers are common and the University requires full payment of the first semester's tuition before starting classes.

How to Pay Tuition

All students must pay one semester's tuition and any on-campus room and board fees during the registration period. Fordham offers multiple ways to pay your bill. Payment may be made by cash, check, wire transfer, debit card or money order. . Fordham also utilizes a service called Convera , which offers a fast and secure way to send payments globally. Make an International Wire Transfer Through the E-Bill Suite with Convera

1. Login to your [E-Bill Suite](#).
2. Click "Make Payment".
3. Enter your balance.
4. Select "Convera International Payment" as your Payment Method.
5. Click "Continue" then "Initiate Payment".
6. Select your country & click "Get a Quote".
7. Choose your preferred transfer method.

8. Enter all requested payment information & click "Next" then "Submit".
9. Follow steps on the downloadable instruction sheet to finish wiring the funds.

Policy for Wire Transfers

Fordham University will only accept wires for admission deposit payments and charges billed directly by the University. This includes but is not limited to:

- Tuition
- Required Fees
- Health Insurance
- Room or Board charges

Do not send excess funds to the University for personal use. If a credit occurs due to a change in bill or class withdrawal, these funds will apply to future charges for the following semester. If you withdraw from the University, we will return the amount of the credit to the original bank account where the wire originated or where applicable through Flywire or Convera.

Please contact Student Financial Services at 718-817-4900 to verify your eligibility for a refund as well as to obtain the proper refund process instructions.

Financial Aid

No financial aid is available to incoming students other than what is awarded during the admission process. Accordingly, you should make sure that your financial position is secure and that you have made the necessary arrangements regarding foreign exchange permits and transfers of funds.

Employment Restrictions

Regulations severely restrict the employment opportunities available to international students. Part-time on-campus employment (up to 20 hrs per week when school is in session and up to 40 hrs during summer and winter breaks) is the only option for newly arrived international students. On-campus jobs, however, are hard to find and relatively low-paying. Therefore, you should not expect to finance your stay in the U.S. through employment.

Credit Cards

International bank transfers are frequently delayed and, in New York City it is difficult to cash checks drawn on overseas banks. Credit cards such as MasterCard and Visa are extremely useful. It is not advisable to carry a lot of cash. You can use your Visa or MasterCard from your home country here, but ask your bank first. It may be necessary to activate your card for overseas use.

Academic Information & Academic Calendar

At Fordham University, the different colleges and departments have individual program and degree requirements. It is therefore essential that you obtain and READ the University bulletin

(catalogue) for your school, not only for its course listings, but also for information pertaining to credits, grades, deadlines, etc. Students can find [Fordham's Academic Calendar](#) online.

All international students are required by immigration regulations to register full-time. For undergraduates, 12 credits is considered full-time; graduate students must take 9 credits; and IALC students must take the full-time intensive program (18 hours per week). Your academic department may require you to take more than the number of credits that is considered full-time for immigration purposes. The Fall term usually goes from late August through December. The Spring term goes from late January through mid-May.

What to Expect from New York Weather

During the summer, June through September, the weather is often hot and humid and requires lightweight clothing. The temperature ranges from 70 degrees Fahrenheit (21 degrees Celsius) to the 90s (above 32 degrees Celsius). A light-weight rain-jacket and an umbrella will be useful as there can be severe rainstorms.

The winter season, late November through March, is marked by sudden and extreme weather changes; several days of cold weather may be followed by days of moderate temperatures. The range in winter is between 20 degrees Fahrenheit (-7 degrees Celsius) 40 degrees Fahrenheit (7 degrees Celsius), and occasionally the temperature drops to zero (-18 degrees Celsius).

New York City often sees a considerable amount of snowfall in the winter. If you are from a very warm climate that does not experience cold winters, you should be prepared to spend at least \$200-300 on warm clothing. In addition, boots are definitely recommended.

The spring and fall seasons are generally moderate. The temperatures range from the 50s Fahrenheit (10 degrees Celsius) to the 70s (20s Celsius). The city receives a moderate amount of rain in these seasons.

Housing

If you do not have a permanent residence upon your arrival, you could contact one of the hotels and hostels below for temporary housing while you settle down in NYC and begin your search for a permanent location.

Off-Campus Housing:

Apartment housing is difficult to find and rents are high. Before moving into an apartment, a security deposit equaling at least one month's rent is usually required. An additional fee of one month's rent was historically paid as a 'broker's fee,' although this practice was recently outlawed. Therefore, students who desire off-campus housing must expect to pay at least the equivalent of the two or three months' rent to move in. In the Bronx, the rent for a one-bedroom apartment ranges from \$2000 to \$3000 (less if you intend to share). Manhattan rents for a studio can range from \$3000 to \$4000. Please note that recently, a few students looking for housing in midtown Manhattan have been obligated to pay a full year of rent up front, in lieu of a U.S. lease co-signer.

Most students try to find roommates to share apartments. Listings are available at the Office of Residential Life.

On-Campus Housing:

Housing on the Rose Hill Campus is available only to undergraduates. However, limited graduate student housing is available in apartments located near the campus. On-campus housing at Lincoln Center is available to undergraduates, and nearby off-campus housing is available to graduate students. Arrangements must be made in advance through the Office of Residential Life at either the Rose Hill or Lincoln Center campuses.

Students are able to move-in early to the Residence Halls, generally a day before the International Student Orientation. Students must email Residential Life to arrange for early move-in. Undergraduate students must complete the Orientation Registration online, which includes move-in information. Detailed information will be emailed during the summer.

Contact Info for the Office of Residential Life can be found at the end of this document.

IMPORTANT: The residential halls on the Rose Hill Campus for undergraduate students close during the winter and spring breaks. Students wishing to stay on campus during University Breaks will need to complete the stay request form. Filling out the form does not guarantee that your request will be granted. Contact the office of Residential Life at Rose Hill if you have any questions at resliferh@fordham.edu or 718-817-3080.

Health Insurance

All students in F-1 or J-1 visa status and their dependents are required to maintain health insurance coverage. You will automatically be charged for Fordham's health insurance coverage. This insurance fee is billed separately from the tuition charge. The annual rate for 2025/2026 is \$4,994—fall semester \$1805, Spring semester \$3189, but considerably more for a spouse or children. If you can provide evidence that you have comparable medical insurance from an outside source, you may be waived from the University's policy. To waive the Fordham health insurance coverage, you must complete an online form AND submit documents to the office of University Health Services. Please visit [Fordham's Health Services webpage](#) to learn about what documents are required for a waiver.

NOTE: You will automatically be billed for health insurance if you do not officially waive Fordham's policy every September.

Immunization & Health Forms

New York State Law requires that all students submit documentation of immunization against Measles, Rubella, and Mumps.

Vaccinations must have been given after your first birthday and must include 2 shots against Measles and one for Mumps and Rubella.

You must bring official documentation of these vaccinations and dates with you, in English or translated, to present at academic registration. You may not be allowed to register for classes without these documents. If you cannot provide specific vaccination information, you may receive vaccinations, for a minimal charge, from the University's Student Health Services. Health Services also offers free Tuberculosis testing. Safety Tips

- Be aware of people around you and keep hold of your wallet or purse, camera and other valuables.
- Do not keep your wallet or cell phone visible while you are walking.
- Keep your passport and money in a pouch under your clothes and have only enough cash in your pocket for your immediate needs.
- At night, travel with other people and stay in well-lit areas.
- If you feel uncomfortable, get in a taxi, walk into a shop or restaurant, or go where there are people.
- Don't hesitate to contact us for any reason.

Be Aware of Scammers

International students in the U.S. may be targeted by scammers, often through phone calls, emails, or social media. The U.S. Department of Homeland Security has reported cases where scammers impersonate government officials or university staff, threatening students' immigration status or academic standing in order to obtain money or personal information.

To protect yourself:

- Guard your personal and financial information. Never share your Social Security number, bank details, or visa information with anyone you do not know.
- Collect contact information. If someone contacts you claiming to be a government or law enforcement official, note their name, phone number, and organization.

- End the conversation if threats persist. Legitimate officials will not pressure you for immediate payment or personal details. Hang up immediately and email us at ois@fordham.edu to report it.
