Aditi Bagchi (Commenter)

Ignatius M. Wilkinson Chair, Professor of Law at Fordham Law School

Aditi Bagchi teaches Contracts and Labor Law. She writes primarily about contract law, especially contract interpretation and questions in political and moral philosophy as they arise in contract. She has a broader interest in comparative political economy and legal philosophy across private law.

Professor Bagchi previously taught at the University of Pennsylvania Law School. In Fall 2019, she was a Visiting Professor at Yale Law School and, in Fall 2021, she was a Visiting Professor at Columbia Law School. Before teaching, she was an associate at Cravath, Swaine & Moore LLP and a clerk for Judge Julio Fuentes on the United State Court of Appeals for the Third Circuit.

Hannah Bloch-Wehba is a legal scholar and expert on law and technology. Her scholarship focuses on how technological change reshapes public governance, with consequences for civil liberties, transparency, and accountability. Her articles on these topics have twice been selected through anonymous peer review for the Harvard/Yale/Stanford Junior Faculty Forum, and have appeared or are forthcoming in the *Indiana Law Journal*, *Northwestern University Law Review*, *California Law Review*, *BYU Law Review*, *Berkeley Technology Law Journal*, *Fordham Law Review*, and many other journals.

Prior to joining the faculty at Texas A&M, Bloch-Wehba taught at Drexel University's Thomas R. Kline School of Law. She is also an Affiliated Fellow at Yale Law School's Information Society Project, an Affiliated Scholar at NYU School of Law's Policing Project, and a Fellow at the Center for Democracy & Technology. In 2024–2025, she was a Member at the Institute for Advanced Study in Princeton.

Bloch-Wehba is a graduate of NYU School of Law, where she was an Institute for International Law & Justice/Law and Security Scholar, and of the University of Texas at Austin. From 2016–2018, she was a supervising attorney in Yale Law School's Media Freedom & Information Access Clinic, a law student clinic dedicated to increasing government transparency, defending the essential work of news gatherers, and protecting freedom of expression by providing pro bono legal services, pursuing impact litigation and developing policy initiatives. Previously, Bloch-Wehba was the inaugural Stanton Foundation National Security–Free Press Fellow at the Reporters Committee for Freedom of

An expert in comparative corporate law and governance, Professor Martin Gelter joined Fordham Law School in 2009. He teaches Corporations, Partnership & LLC law, Comparative Corporate Law, and Accounting for Lawyers. His research explores corporate governance in its comparative and international dimensions, focusing on the United States and Europe. He is also interested in securities law, law and economics, law and finance, law and accounting, empirical legal studies, and comparative private law. His research has appeared in English, German, and French and has been translated into several other languages. Before joining Fordham in 2009, Martin was an assistant professor at Vienna University of Economics, a Considine Fellow in Law and Economics at Harvard Law School, and a Visiting Fellow at the University of Bologna. He has been a Visiting Professor at University Paris-II and National Taiwan University. He has also been an Academic Visitor at Oxford, a Fernand Braudel Senior Fellow at the European University Institute in Florence, and a Senior Fellow in the Program for the Foundations of Law and Finance at Goethe University of Frankfurt.
