
















Another theatre was built on the site, called Royal Brunswick, which opened on 25 February 1828, yet its roof collapsed just three days after opening. The Sailors' Home was built there instead; an illustration can be found in the *Penny Illustrated Paper* from 29 August 1868.




The destructive appearance of the Brunswick Theatre, on Thursday, February 28th, 1828, when the roof fell, and killed and wounded so many persons, who were present at a rehearsal. On these ruins, George Charles Smith, R.N., Minister of the Mariners' Church, Welclose Square, directed and superintended all the work of sailors from the Asylum in Dock Street, and firemen and labourers, in digging out all the killed and wounded, and here he planned the first Sailors' Home, and held the first public meeting to build a Sailors' Home, which has since been accomplished by Captain Robert Elliot, R.N., as the origin of the Sailors' Home in the East India Road, and of all the Sailors' Homes in the













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
